

Is the Rusty-Patched Bumblebee Making a Comeback?

Bumblebees—they're fuzzy, they're buzzy, and they do important work to pollinate our food and wildflowers.

Native bees, including bumblebees, are vital to the ecosystem and deserve our care and attention.

In 2017, a native bee - the rusty-patched bumblebee - was listed as federally endangered. In the lead up to this time, sightings of the bee dropped off drastically.

The reasons for the decline aren't known for sure, but it could have been a combination of disease, pesticides, habitat loss and degradation, and competition from non-native bees, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

TLC monitors its sites and easements for the presence of bees. And, the

good news is, rusty-patched bumblebees have been spotted at several sites.

Over the summer, TLC's CLIP interns and staff surveyed seven sites for bumblebees, including the rusty-patched bumblebee.

The surveys consisted of spending one hour at the site per person, every 7-10 days, for three site visits.

The interns observed the rusty-patched bumblebee at three TLC sites through their monitoring, (and randomly at Ryders Woods, where they weren't officially monitoring!).

Overall, rusty-patched bumblebees have been spotted at eight TLC sites and easements, including Boloria Meadows, Irish Oaks Nature Preserve, Thompson Road Preserve and Yonder Prairie Nature Preserve, which are open to the public.

What accounts for their presence?

Volunteers and staff have been working hard at these sites to remove invasive brush, which

allows native plants to be seeded and take root. An increase in prairie restorations, pollinator gardens and native plantings at homes and homeowners' associations (HOAs) throughout the county are also making a difference for our native bees.

So, thank you for everything you do to help the native bees of McHenry County, both at home and through your support of TLC. It's proof that preserving land for life helps preserve the endangered rusty-patched bumblebee, too!

Rusty-patched bumblebees love a variety of native plants. Here are some that the interns spotted them on at TLC sites:



- * Monarda Fistulosa (wild bergamot)
- * Rattlesnake Master
- * Joe Pye Weed (*Eutrochium purpureum*)
- * Tall/American Bellflower
- * Virginia Mountain Mint



News and Notes

from Executive Director, *Lisa Haderlein*

In 2006, TLC started a program called Project Quercus (Quercus is Latin for oak). We had learned that McHenry County had lost nearly 90% of the oak woods that once covered the landscape, and of the woods remaining,

85% were on private property. Oaks are McHenry County's keystone tree species. Many species like songbirds, butterflies and mammals depend upon them for life.

Since TLC specializes in partnering with private landowners to help them preserve and restore the land they own, preserving the county's remaining oak woods fit squarely in TLC's wheelhouse.

Project Quercus has two goals:

1. Preserve as much of the remaining oak woods as possible through private conservation efforts, including land protection and land management, and
2. Begin planting oaks throughout the county with a variety of partners — schools, municipalities, civic organizations, etc. — to ensure oaks remain a part of our heritage for future generations.

Over the last 20 years, many thousands of oaks were planted, hundreds of acres are now preserved, and thousands of acres of oak woods are being managed by private landowners. But there is still more to be done!

TLC is part of a grant awarded to the Morton Arboretum by the US Forest Service aimed at increasing oak trees in areas that had oaks historically, but have low canopy cover today. In McHenry County, that description points right at Harvard.

While the city and surrounding area were once heavily wooded, and many legacy oaks can still be found throughout the city, Harvard has a canopy cover of just 15%. A healthy urban tree canopy should be at least 30%.

On page 2, you'll see the work Anna Evans is doing through the grant. For the next couple of years, her job is to help get more oaks planted in and around Harvard, to inspire more residents to take care of the oaks that they have, and to increase resources available for restoring the remaining oak woodlands in and around the city.

Thank you for supporting TLC's work preserving oaks and other land resources that make McHenry County such a wonderful place to live. You make a difference that generations of residents will see! Thank you!!

Did you know that the City of Harvard was once an oak woodland?

Many old oaks remain, but their numbers are declining as they reach the end of their natural lives.

Thanks to support from you, and a grant from the Morton Arboretum, TLC is providing no-cost **Conservation@Home** site visits in Harvard to spread the word about oaks and the many benefits they provide.

The Alvarez family of Harvard is the first to receive a site visit through the program—they were interested in adding more native plants and trees to their property.

Sandi Alvarez booked a **Conservation@Home** visit with Anna Evans, TLC's Oak Outreach Specialist. They walked the property, noted

the invasive and native species present, and talked about their options for management.

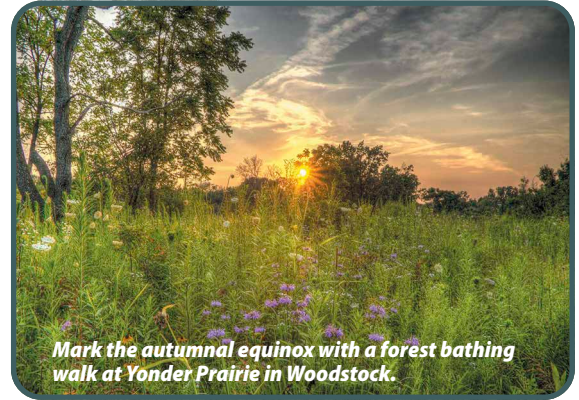
Autumn Equinox Guided Forest Bathing Walk
